

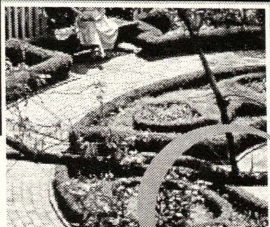

## Profiles 2000

### BILL THOMPSON

Bill Thompson has been an editor of Landscape Architecture magazine in Washington DC since 1988. In this capacity he has written about a wide range of topics within the field of landscape architecture, with a particular focus on issues of ecological design and sustainability. He recently co-authored (with landscape architect Kim Sorvig) the book *Sustainable Landscape Construction: A Manual of Green Building Outdoors*, to be published this May by Island Press. A native of Atlanta, Bill Thompson holds a Master of Landscape Architecture degree from the University of Georgia (1981) as well as a previous Master of Arts in English Literature from Duke University. Last year he was elected a fellow of the American Society of Landscape Architects.

### KAREN A. PHILLIPS

Born and raised in Ocilla, Georgia, Karen was initially trained as a landscape architect at UGA's School of Environmental Design. She later graduated with a Master's Degree from the Graduate School of Design at Harvard University in 1982, with a focus on real estate development and urban planning. She is the founder, President, and Chief Executive Officer of the Abyssinian Development Corporation (ADC), an independent community-based, not-for-profit organization initiated in 1987 by volunteers from Harlem's Abyssinian Baptist Church. Under her leadership ADC now has over \$65 million invested in the Harlem community and currently employs 55 people with a consolidated budget of \$3.5 million. In 1998, Karen was elected as a fellow in ASLA and in 1999, Crain's New York Business named her one of the "100 most influential women in New York."

### JOHN C. WATERS

As an educator, author, and activist, John Waters has been actively involved in historic preservation within Georgia since 1966. Since that date he has been a founder of several non-profit organizations, including the Athens-Clarke Heritage Foundation and the Joseph Henry Lumpkin Foundation. He has served on the boards of the Georgia

Conservancy and the Georgia Trust for Historic Preservation, as well as numerous other local, state, and national preservation organizations. John co-authored Georgia's preservation enabling legislation in 1980, and shortly following authored the classic text, *Maintaining a Sense of Place: A Citizen's Guide to Historic Preservation*. In 1981, John created, and since that time has directed, the two-year Master of Historic Preservation program in the SED. John holds BLA and MLA degrees from the University of Georgia with post graduate studies in historic preservation at both Cornell and the University of Vermont.

### FRANK BOFFA

A founding principal of the firm Boffa-Miskell, Frank has practiced as a landscape architect for over 25 years and has worked on a wide range of landscape planning and development projects throughout New Zealand, Southeast Asia and the Pacific. As a landscape planner, Boffa is involved in the assessment of environmental impacts, advising on the development of large-scale projects and formulating land use and resource management policies. His landscape design work includes numerous commercial, industrial, tourism and public open space projects in urban, rural and coastal environments. For his part in establishing and promoting the profession of landscape architecture in New Zealand, Frank was awarded life membership in the New Zealand Institute of Landscape Architects, the Institute's highest honor, in 1998, where he is a fellow and past president. Frank received his BLA degree from the University of Georgia in 1968.

### STACY R. PATTON

Stacy R. Patton is Project Manager for the Nature Conservancy of Georgia and has served in this position since March 1998. In this capacity, Stacy directs the Chattahoochee River Initiative and is involved in other conservation projects around the state. Prior to this, she served as a Senior Facility Planner for Oglethorpe Power Corporation's Economic Development Division, where she assisted in the

development of "Best Management Practices for Construction in Wetland Systems." Stacy received her MLA degree from UGA's School of Environmental Design in 1986.

### MACK CAIN

Mack, as Director of the Landscape Architecture and Land Planning Division of Jordan Jones & Goulding, has over 25 years of experience in a wide range of projects including planning, design, and implementation services on development projects including commercial, institutional, recreational, residential, and resort projects. He has been recognized with numerous State and National Awards, including two awards given by First Ladies at the White House. Mack is a 1975 graduate of the University of Georgia School of Environmental Design.

### LIZ COLE

Liz is Director of the Greenways, Parks, and Open Space Group for Jordan Jones & Goulding and is experienced in providing planning, design, and implementation services for a variety of project types. She has worked with community groups, governmental and regulatory agencies in transforming sites into recreational and educational facilities and has also organized and facilitated stakeholder workshops and the development of partnerships for implementation. Liz holds a degree in landscape architecture from the Rhode Island School of Design.

### CHRISTINE MAGNARELLA

Christine is a Project Designer at Jordan Jones & Goulding with experience in planning, design, and implementation for a variety of project types with a focus on linking environmental issues with planning and design. Projects include the development of greenway corridors and multi-use trailways, parks and playgrounds, industrial and commercial developments. Christine holds a Master of Landscape Architecture Degree from the University of Georgia (1997), with a certificate of Conservation Ecology and Sustainable Development. ■

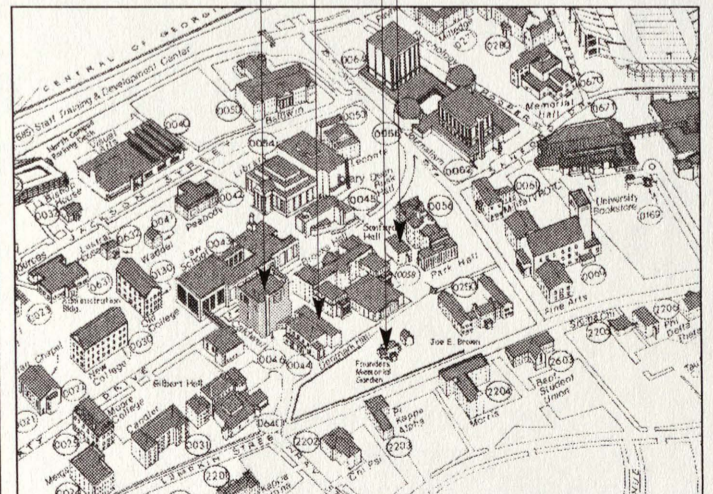
