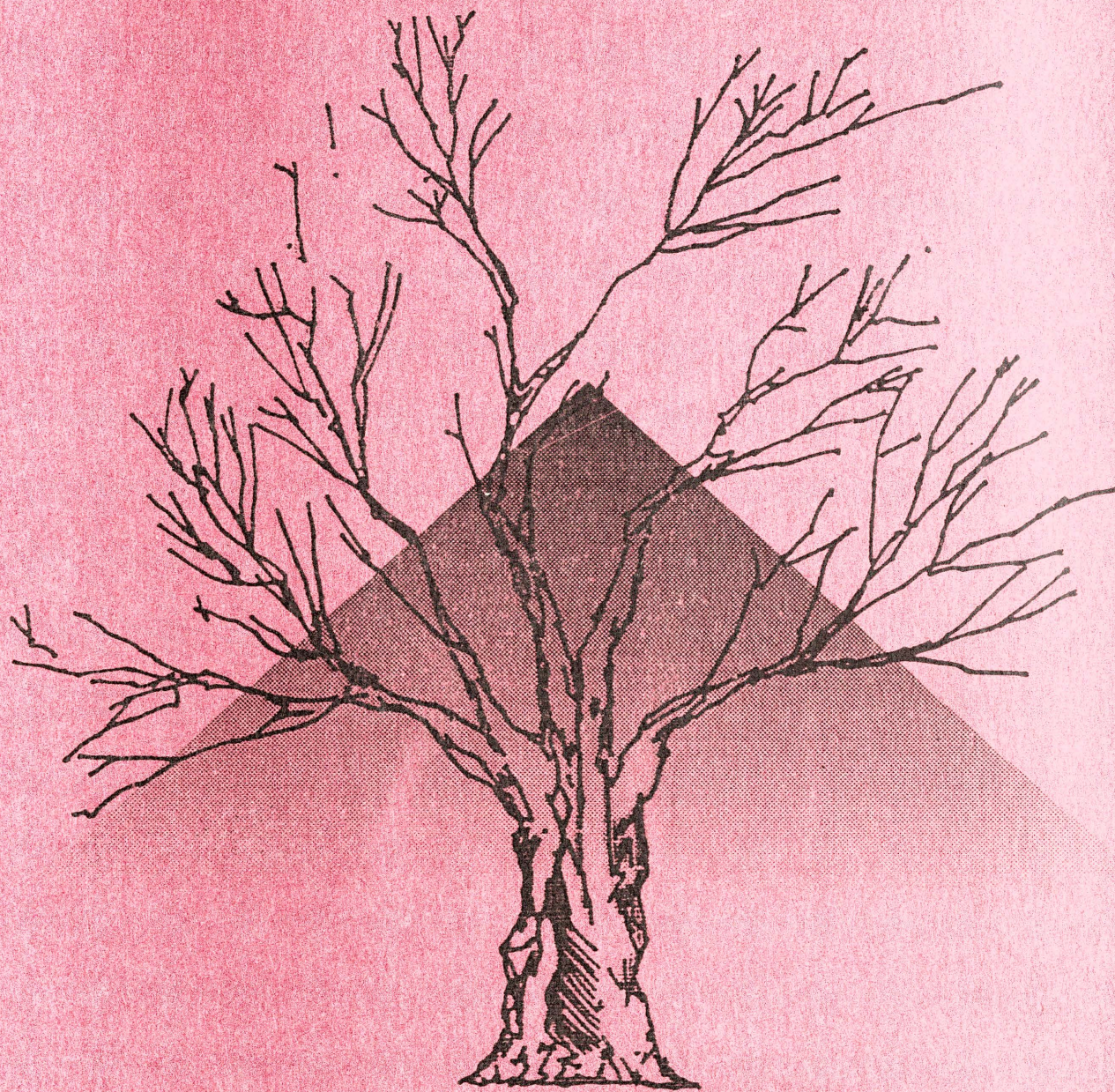


Dear Friends:

1994 DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI MEDAL

Robert J. Hill

Professor Bob Hill has over 33 years of service to the University of Georgia. After five years with the Institute of Community and Area Development, he joined the School of Environmental Design, where he has taught and has served as Director of Resident Instruction and Advisor for all undergraduates since 1966. He was the first recipient of the School's Distinguished Faculty Award in 1977, and, in the same year, received the Certificate of Merit and Recognition of Excellence as a Landscape Architecture Educator from the Southeastern Region, Council of Educators in Landscape Architecture.

Bob served as President of the Georgia Chapter, American Society of Landscape Architects in 1974-1975 and on its Executive Committee during 1974-1976. From 1972-1982, he served as Advisor to the Student Chapter, ASLA. From 1980-1982, Professor Hill was a member of the Board of Directors, State Botanical Garden of Georgia, and from 1973-1993 he served as Director of the Founder Memorial Garden.

Bob Hill's body of work is best represented by the hundreds of students who have been served by his advisement and who have graduated from the School during his tenure.

1994 DISTINGUISHED FACULTY AWARD

Scott Weinberg

Professor Weinberg joined the School of Environmental Design faculty in 1982 and has taught in the primary areas of engineering technology, computer technology for landscape architects, and planting design. In addition, he has been a frequent advisor/major professor on senior design projects and graduate theses. This summer marks his fourth year of teaching in the Cortona program; as Internship Coordinator, Scott places 50-60 students throughout the United States (and elsewhere) each year.

Scott Weinberg's teaching often goes beyond the classroom: since 1985, he and Professor Roger Moore have conducted a hands-on computer lab at the ASLA Annual Meetings, typically attended by 500-600 registrants. In addition, he has taught or co-taught numerous ASLA-sponsored computer workshops in Athens and elsewhere. In 1988 and 1992, he co-edited volumes three and four of the Handbook of Landscape Architectural Construction; he serves as computer editor for Landscape Architect and Specifier News; and, since 1988, he has chaired the Landscape Architecture Foundation Publication Committee.

A previous recipient of the SEDAA Distinguished Faculty Award, Scott was the School's Nominee for the University's Meigs Teaching Award in 1990 and 1991.

Guidelines
DISTINGUISHED FACULTY AWARD
School of Environmental Design Alumni Association

(Revised April 1983, December 1984, October 1992)

Annual Award

- Presented to the outstanding faculty member of the School of Environmental Design, The University of Georgia by the School of Environmental Design Alumni Association.

Type of Award

- Recipient will have his/her name inscribed on an appropriate plaque to hang in the Hubert B. Owens Reading Room, as well as receive a personalized pewter mug.

Basis for Award

- Outstanding contribution to the School of Environmental Design in one or more of the following categories during the past five years:
 1. teaching
 2. research
 3. public service
 4. service to the profession or leadership
- Annual award not to be given unless conditions merit.
- A faculty member receiving the award will not be eligible to receive the award again during the next three years.
- A minimum of two years service will be required of a faculty member to be eligible.

Nominations may be made by the Dean, faculty members, students, and submitted to the Chairman of the Award Committee.

Selection Procedure

- The President of the School of Environmental Design Alumni Association, with assistance from the Dean, will appoint a committee composed of the following:
 1. One member of the SEDAA to serve as Chairman and up to two additional alumni.
 2. Two faculty members from the School of Environmental Design, the University of Georgia who are not eligible for the award in that year (generally, the two previous award winners).
 3. Three students of the School of Environmental Design, the University of Georgia. One to be a fifth-year student, one to be a MLA graduate student, and one MHP graduate student.
- The Dean, or person designated by the Dean, shall prepare a one-page, typewritten statement relative to the qualifications of each individual nominated for the award.
- The committee will be furnished a list of the nominees and a one-page statements on each nominee by the Dean.
- The committee may request supportive materials and information from the Dean, faculty members, or from prospective recipients. Such things as biographical information, statements, examples of innovative teaching materials or techniques, publications, research, public service activities may be requested as a bases for judging individual performances.
- The committee shall submit their final decision to the School of Environmental Design Alumni Association prior to the actual award ceremony.

DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI MEDAL
School of Environmental Design Alumni Association

(Adopted May 24, 1986)

Purpose

- To recognize School of Environmental Design Alumni who have contributed substantially by way of professional achievement to the reputation and well-being of professional achievement to the reputation and well-being of the University of Georgia, School of Environmental Design. This is the highest award given by the School of Environmental Design Alumni Association.

Criteria

- Outstanding Professional Achievement is, by nature, difficult to define, and is best determined by a vote among peers. Professional achievement can occur in a wide range of activities within the discipline of landscape architecture. These are:

1. excellence in executed works of landscape architecture
2. public service and/or administration
3. professional school instruction
4. writing, research, or other scholarly endeavors
5. direct service to the School of Environmental Design

Procedures

- School of Environmental Design Alumni can be nominated by any alumnus, by any faculty member, or by any student. Nominations shall be accompanied by a resume of the nominee's professional activity. The nominee will be voted on by the School of Environmental Design Alumni Association Steering Committee. Members of the Steering Committee are not eligible during their terms.

The Award

- The award will be in the form of a medal, bearing the emblem of the School of Environmental Design, the Alumnus' name, and an inscription stating the purpose of the award. The award may be given annually. No more than one award will be given in any calendar year.

We are blessed with a soil type that promotes strong fibrous roots. To this natural advantage we have added a system of water table control. This combination enables us to produce trees that will thrive for you.
2. **CONSULTATION SERVICE** - We have learned a lot (too often the hard way) during our fifty-four years of experience and we are always glad to discuss problems with you. There's a good chance that we may be able to spot a latent site problem for you. So often one specie will thrive and give the desired effect under adverse conditions, where another may fail.
3. **SALES** - Most of our business is conducted on the phone but we prefer that you come to see us. We request that you call ahead and make an appointment.

We cannot accomodate "pop-in" trucks. All orders must be placed at least 2 weeks in advance.

Reburlapping of trees necessitated because of customer delays will be charged for.

Prices are F.O.B. Nursery and include tying down but do not include the cost of tie down material and covers. If these items are not furnished by the customer, they will be charged for.

All sales are final. There will be a charge of 25% of catalogue price for substitutions or cancellations after an order is dug.

A deposit of 25% is required of PROJECT OWNER within two weeks of tagging to reserve material that will not be used within 30 days of tagging date. This bill will be sent with the acknowledgment. This will reserve material for 90 days from tagging date. If additional extensions are requested, 25% will be required for each additional 90 days. If the material is not used within one year, all deposits will be forfeited. If any requested deposit is not received within 30 days, prior deposits will be forfeited and the order will be cancelled without additional notice.

Prices quoted are for trees tagged in grade. Trees that grow out of grade will be priced on grade at time of digging. If trees grow out of grade because of delays in ship date and are re-tagged to original-grade, the 25% deposit will be forfeited.

4. **SUMMER DIGGING** - We have worked out a technique for safe growing season digging to enable you to meet summer construction schedules.

Hand-Dig Service - Shady Grove now offers hand-digging by special request on trees from 5" to 10" caliper. This affords extra-special handling that few other nurseries can offer. The service is available for an additional 10% of the catalogue price. Trees larger than 10" will continue to be hand-dug at no extra cost.

5. **DELIVERY** - Our delivery trucks are specialized pieces of equipment. They carry a 19 ton payload and have fast, flexible, integral cranes capable of handling trees of 6" to 7" caliper up close or 3 1/2" cal. at 25' where accessible to our trucks. Most of our customers dig their own holes ahead and have us place their trees for them. This will also provide you with an operator-placer who is the best in the business. The cost of the crane is \$55.00 per hour for the time the truck is on the job. There is a minimum charge of \$20.00 per drop. Mileage is charged at \$2.20 per loaded mile. We can usually arrange split loads, or if you have a large volume of trees to plant, we can arrange for dependable tractor trailers to run with or without our truck.
6. **TERMS** - 30 days net; Accounts without established credit C.O.D. only; wire transfer or check in advance when shipment is not via our trucks. Overdue accounts are subject to a 2.0% per month service charge (min. 50 cents) plus cost of collecting, if any.
7. **REPLACEMENTS** - We are old landscape contractors and know full well that replacements can be a big expense item. We do everything possible on our part to insure that our trees arrive on your job in excellent condition. We cannot be responsible for failures due to conditions beyond our control. In no case will our liability exceed the original invoice value.
