

## Swap Shop at UGA Final Project Report

## **Project Description**

The Swap Shop at UGA is a place to trade goods at no cost to consumers. This encourages reuse of items while eliminating accessibility barriers. The Swap Shop was opened March 5th, 2021 in MLC room 278. The shop was open on Friday's from 10:30 am - 3:30 pm during the Spring semester and will reopen in the Fall. The Shop participated in 3 outreach and tabling events throughout the semester including the Earth Day fair at Tate, Earth Day fair at Southern Brewing Company, and a pop-up shop on reading day at O-House. The Swap Shop also coordinated two spring cleaning collection drives with Greek Goes Green and Franklin Residential College. All infrastructure for the shop was donated second hand from the surplus property listserv at UGA, CHaRM, and the Red Zone in Athens. Additionally, the Swap Shop at UGA team expanded by bringing on three volunteer positions which will continue into the Fall and Spring semesters of the 2021-22 school year.

This project was completed because we saw a need on campus for second hand items to be available to students at no cost. Student life is extremely transient and items related to student life are often in our lives for short periods of time. This space takes these items and recirculates them back onto campus and into the hands of students. Additionally, this space closes the transportation gap between off campus second hand stores and campus. The Swap Shop at UGA is a clear and visible sustainability measure that futhers UGA's efforts toward waste reduction and community support.

This project directly relates to the UGA 2020 strategic plan goal 7g. 7g highlights the reduction of waste to the landfill by 65% by 2020. This project redirects used items from typical waste streams and brings them back to campus to encourage reuse. This project also directly relates to the 2025 strategic goal 1.4. Goal 1.4 states "promote academic access and success for all students, with particular consideration for underrepresented, rural, first-generation and other underserved students." The Swap Shop would support underrepresented, rural, first-generation, and underserved students by providing access to items that are required for comfortable and successful student life. Purchasing new is oftentimes expensive and many students lack the resources to buy essential items. Furthermore, students without a car have a higher barrier to participate in sustainable purchasing decisions and donations, the Swap Shop would eliminate this barrier with on campus access to this key sustainability measure. This shop, again, would house items directly related to student life and provide said items at no cost. Other student groups that would greatly benefit from this are international students. Students in this demographic are typically only here for a short amount of time and purchasing items for comfortable living doesn't always make sense and, again, encourages a disposable society.

This is an ongoing project and the Swap Shop at UGA will be open beginning again this Fall, hopefully with expanded hours.

# Characterization of Items Swapped March 5th - May 4th




Figure 1: Characterization of Items Swapped March 5th - May 4th pie chart
