## **IMPACT ON WOMEN**

- **Higher mortality rate** in natural\_disasters (Neumayer & Plümper 2007), largely due to 'gender-specific socioeconomic factors' (551)
- Relative vulnerability of women climate migrants (Chindarkar 4, 2012)
- Terry (2009) differentiates between 'mitigation' and 'adaptation'


## PRESENCE IN WPS & NAPs

- As of 2019, represents ~7% of states' NAPs (Shepherd 11, 2020)
- Mawby and Applebaum (2020) argue WPS is essential to climate migration discourse.
  - Policy through the UNSC creates more powerful legislation, but also prone to blockage via vetos (11)

# **DATA ANALYSIS**

- All GS but Middle East (trend of most to least instances): Climate change, sustainable, environment, natural environ., social environ.
- "Climate change:" most instances; ME only 9, with "environment" and "social environ." as highest
- Great instance in GS for "environmental or resource management;" at least 1 NAP in each region: social topic on climate change (e.g. refugee conditions, women's leadership, etc.); Asia covers women's role in environ. most (2/5 NAPs)



### **RESULTS**

- Climate Change: 414 overall
- Regional averages
  - Latin America (14.5)
    - Highest: Argentina
  - Asia (11.6)
    - Highest: Philippines
  - Africa (11.56)
    - Highest: Gabon
  - Middle East (2.25)
    - Highest: Lebanon
- 27/37 countries mentioned Sustainable Development Goals

# CONCLUSIONS

- Women: ↑ mortality rate = all GS
   NAPs cover social/gendered topic on climate
- "Environ. conditions in refugee camps," "security," etc. = "vulnerability of women climate migrants"
- M&A: WPS crucial to climate migration;
   GS least instances = "social environ.," need more focus on women
- "Climate change" in WPS
  lens → double priority for women
  (social and environ.) = UNSC policy as
  "more powerful legislation"
- Challenge: GS disprop. effects of climate change → hard to tell who's hit hardest, how women fare
