

1806 Hofwyl-Broadfield Plantation

The redesign of the Hofwyl-Broadfield Plantation will popularize the state park by revealing the historical importance and exhibiting the beautiful natural environment.

Hofwyl-Broadfield Plantation is considered one of the last preserved historic rice plantations that thrived along the Georgia coast. The plantation was established in 1806 by William Bradford to produce rice in the salt marshes of Glynn County. After the civil war, the plantation quit harvesting rice and became a dairy farm. After many successful years, the dairy farm closed in 1940 leaving the farm to be privately maintained. Ophelia and her sister Miriam Dent were the last residents. They dedicated their lives to preserve the legacy of their family and the history of the plantation. Ophelia donated the plantation to the State of Georgia as a historic park in 1973. Today the historic property is to be reimaged to attract visitors into this beautiful and historically rich landscape.

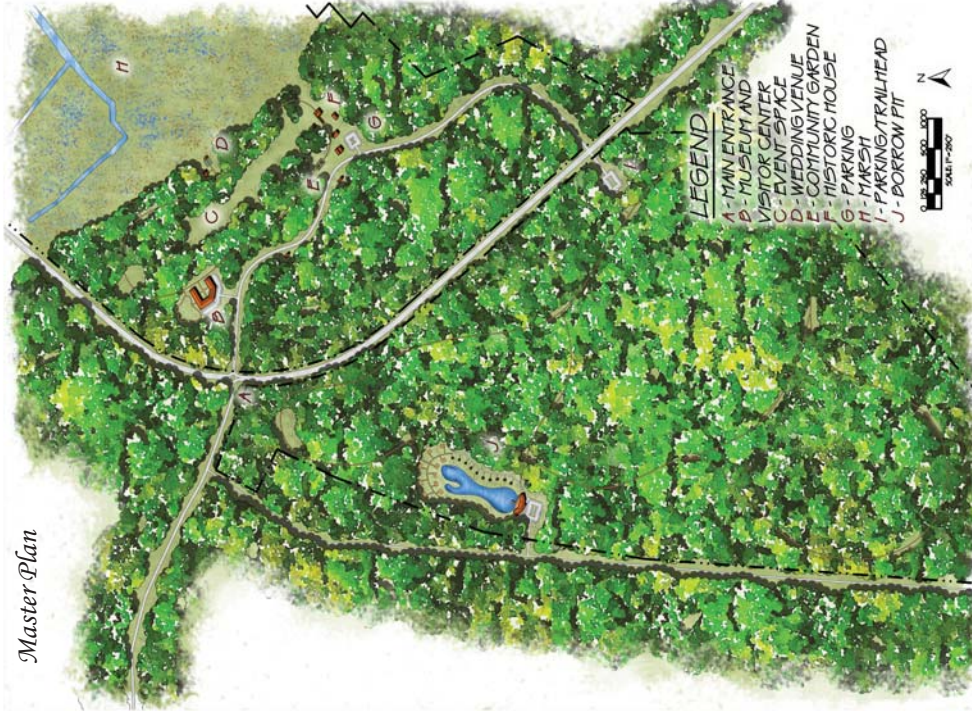

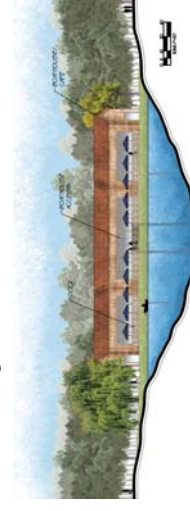

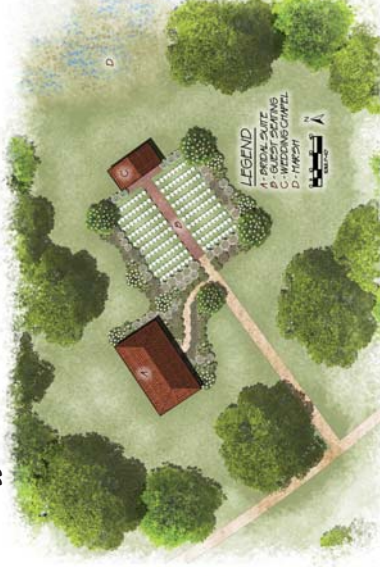
